

VOTERS SUPPORT LEGISLATION TO STOP CUTS TO MEDICARE HOME HEALTH

PROPOSED HOME HEALTH CUTS **UNFAVORABLE AMONG VOTERS**

Medicare has proposed a permanent 7.69% payment cut to Medicare home health services plus \$2 billion in "clawback" cuts beginning in 2024, with the potential for additional cuts in years beyond.

In total, these cuts could reach \$18.15 billion over the next ten years. Estimates suggest these cuts could put 44% of America's home health agencies at risk of closure, significantly risking patient access to care.

Methodology: This poll was conducted between July 22-July 24, 2022 among a sample of 2,005 registered voters. The interviews are provided by the provided provwere conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on gender by age, educational attainment, race, marital status, home ownership, race by educational attainment, 2020 presidential vote, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.





VOTERS OPPOSE MEDICARE CUTS TO HOME HEALTH
